Building high quality ECD research and practice in S.A.: Birth to Grade R

This conference could not come at a more important time for ECD in South Africa as we face the ongoing effects of a pandemic on the sector, battle to engage our government and strive to achieve quality, despite these constraints. For the first time SARAECE is collaborating with two other organizations namely CECD and CPUT as part of this conference. This is also indicative of where ECD is, at this present time. By this I mean that collaboration is now imperative if the ECD sector is to go from strength to strength. CECD represents an organization in the trenches battling to improve ECD at all levels. They have been engaged in this battle since 1994 and have continued to take up the mantle to force government to step-up. In the course of 2020 and 2021, they have driven protests, put out publications on the topic and engaged in legal action. Professor Eric Atmore is the Director of CECD as well as an academic affiliated to University of Cape Town and Stellenbosch. He is a stalwart in the field and a strong advocate for equitable access, and transformation of the ECD field. He has become affectionately known as 'Mr ECD' over the course of 2020 and 2021 with a strong media presence that regularly challenges both the interviewer and the listener by spotlighting the day-to-day issues in the most impoverished areas of the sector.

Professor Hasina Ebrahim is a dedicated researcher who has won the UNISA Women in Research Leadership Award and continuously puts forward the agenda of an equitable access to high quality ECD programmes for all children in South Africa. She is a strong researcher and has mentored a number of teacher educators, teachers and practitioners in the ECD field. This has allowed many novice academics to spread their wings. Her work as the UNESCO Co-Chair Early Education, Care and Development, has further raised the voice of ECD both nationally and internationally.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Prof Hasina Banu Ebrahim

Hasina Banu Ebrahim is a research professor in the Department of Early Childhood Education at UNISA. She also holds the UNESCO Co-chair in Early Education, Care and Development. She is a rated researcher with the National Research Foundation. Her research coheres around the theme Early Childhood at the Margins with special reference to policy, practice and workforce development. Equity, Diversity and Inclusion is at the heart of her work. Professor Ebrahim won the 2017 & the 2020 UNISA Women in Research Leadership Award. She was the first runner up in the South African Women in Science Award in 2018. She has numerous publications in national and international journals. She is the sector editor for the South African Journal of Childhood Education and serves on editorial boards of a number of international ECD journals. Prof Ebrahim is the convener of the knowledge generation working group in the Early Childhood Cluster in the African Union and a core team member of the ECD fellowship programme in the African Early Childhood Network. She headed national projects on curriculum and professionalisation of ECD. She is currently involved in two international projects on ECD systems and African-based Capacity Building for ECD. Her forthcoming co-edited research-focused books are: *Responding and speaking back to a global pandemic in ECCE*, *Sankofa in the time of Covid – Reflections on ECD*. To transform ECD teacher education she has co-edited a scholarly text entitled *Curriculum, Pedagogy and Assessment: A Handbook for ECE*.

Prof Eric Atmore (Director of the Centre for Early Childhood Development)

Professor Eric Atmore is the Director of the Centre for Early Childhood Development, a national resource and training organisation based in Cape Town. He holds a Masters degree in Social Planning with a thesis on early childhood development policy in South Africa and a Doctorate in Education Policy Studies with a thesis on ECD policy in South Africa from 1990 to 2015. Amongst projects he has been involved in are:



He was the project manager for the nation-wide ECD audit study in 2000.

He was part of an ECD task team appointed by Minister Naledi Pandor to undertake an extensive review of Grade R and ECD in South Africa.

He founded the National Early Childhood Development Alliance in 2005

He founded the Cape Town Museum of Childhood in 2015.

He is also currently Adjunct Associate Professor of Social Development at the University of Cape Town and Extraordinary Associate Professor at the University of Stellenbosch department of Education Policy Studies.

He has written and published widely in South Africa and internationally.
